2016 ROTC Scholarship Awards Program Fund Raising Golf Tournament How to be an active participant

his is the time of year that we ask our members to donate their time, talents and/or treasure in support of our primary philanthropic endeavor – our ROTC Scholarship Awards Program. We are asking all chapter members to participate in one way or another. Last year we set a goal of 50% participation, but the best we could do was 28%. This year we are going to take another stab at that 50% goal and see if we can reach it, I'm confident that we can. Support can be in form of entering as a player, sponsoring a hole, sponsoring a soldier or wounded warrior to play, donating merchandise or gift certificates/cards suitable for a prize, helping in some capacity on tournament day, or a combination of the aforementioned.

Hole Sponsorships. A donation of \$125 will sponsor a hole. You can sponsor a hole in your name, or in memory of a loved one. If you know of any business, civic or church group, or friend that would be willing to support a noble program ask them to sponsor a hole. Sponsorship entitles the sponsor to a professionally fabricated sign with the inscription, "This Hole Sponsored by", followed by the sponsor's name and/or other desired designation, prominently displayed on one of the tee boxes during the tournament. The names of all sponsors are widely publicized in all tournament literature, our chapter newsletter, and our website.

Active Duty Soldiers Sponsorships: Our program to sponsor our active duty soldiers and wounded warriors to play in our golf tournament as our guests is a popular one. Our soldiers have a great time and our sponsors get a great sense of satisfaction in treating them. Our goal this year

is to sponsor at least 60 active duty soldiers; the cost will be \$70 per soldier (the player entry fee). The

benefits of this program are several, but suffice it to say that it presents us with an opportunity to thank our active duty soldiers for their service by treating them to a great golf outing; and, it presents them an opportunity to interact with us.

Donations. A popular feature of our tournament is the drawing for prizes by players who purchase "Mulligan" chances. A ticket is issued for each "Mulligan" purchased and these tickets are used to draw for prizes. Prizes consist of golf related merchandise or accessories, or gift certificates/cards from restaurants and other commercial enterprises. Donations of such items are welcome and encouraged.

USO volunteer initiative

s our nation observes the USO's 75th anniversary of service to our nation's military this year, it presents an opportunity for our Chapter to rededicate our efforts in support of USO activities here in Fayetteville and Fort Bragg.

The CFC Board of Directors has been exploring ways of getting more of our chapter members actively involved in service projects in support of our military and their families here at Fort Bragg with the goal of promoting chapter cohesion, esprit de corps, and a sense of purpose and self-fulfillment.

The only chapter members who are actively engaged in chapter activities on a regular basis are a small number who serve on the board of directors and special staff, plus a dozen or so USO volunteers. We have not had much success in encouraging the other 95% of our members to get involved other than attending an occasional meeting now and then. Other MOAA chapters have undertaken projects such as adopting a VA health facility or nursing home, a military museum, and the like, to get their members actively engaged in a chapter-sponsored endeavor.

USO volunteerism is by no means new to our chapter, since the USO center at the Fayetteville Regional Airport opened in November 2011 a small number of our chapter members (11 to 14) have volunteered their services as USO stewards at the airport lounge. The number has remained relatively constant, with only 12 currently serving. We would like to inject new energy into this program by perhaps increasing that number to 50 or more; not unrealistic when one considers that we have close to 300 members, plus approximately 250 spouses. (Approximately 50% of our current volunteers are husbandwife teams.)

The Fayetteville Airport USO Center is behind security on the second floor of the airport. The center is 100% operated by volunteers who have gone through the badging process and are dedicated to keeping the center open, available and a comfortable center for our traveling military and their families. At this time, the USO needs dependable volunteers who are willing to commit to at least 8 hours per month serving in the center. There is also a dire need for volunteers to work at the Fort Bragg USO Center located in the Soldier Support Center at Fort Bragg.

Distinguished Military Service Is Prologue To A Whole New Career

ave Baggett (Colonel, US Army, Retired) has the appearance and bearing of a military officer, and indeed he is that. But his long Army service (30 years, count-

ing his four years at West
Point) do not entirely define
him. Don't misunderstand
– he is proud of his Army
career and has many happy
memories of it.

Baggett was born in California but grew up in a small town in Oklahoma, working on the family farm. When he was appointed to West Point, he did not have a family tradition to fulfill.

He simply switched his aim from the University of Oklahoma, which he'd planned to attend, and set off for the US Military Academy, determined to become the best Army officer that he could be.

"I never had a bad day in the Army," he says. "It was wonderful to live and work within a

culture that valued trust and integrity." When that career came to a close, after such satisfying achievements as attaining the rank of O6, commanding a battalion in the 82d Airborne Divi-

sion, and serving as the IG in USAREUR, Baggett was living in Germany. He initially transitioned into a defense contractor job for a year that compensated him well but made no extraordinary demands on his time or expertise. By that time, the Baggett family had been living in Europe for six years and they thought it was time to come home – and to them, like so many Army veterans, that

meant the Fort Bragg area.

After returning Stateside, however, a vague restlessness prompted Baggett to ponder the possibilities of an entirely new career, one that he had considered as a young man and dismissed as he turned his attention to excelling in

the Army. Having once considered medical school, he found himself signing up for the Physician Assistant program at Methodist College. He graduated in 2000, and has built himself a whole new resume in the years since that beginning, having developed a particular interest in cardiology.

He is currently the Methodist University Campus Physician Assistant, having practiced since his graduation with several local practices, including Fayetteville Gastroenterology Associates and others. He is focused on the specialty of cardiology, including two years as a surgical first assistant in cardiovascular and thoracic surgery.

Baggett's wife, Magda, is retired from Methodist University, where she served in several Director positions and ultimately as an assistant dean. The Baggetts have four sons, scattered across the globe from Stuttgart to Singapore, and have seven grand-children. Married for more than four decades, the Baggetts share a commitment to service as Rotarians. On that score Baggett's interest in medicine shines through when he says, "It's Rotarians who are going to eliminate polio!"

As for MOAA, Baggett says he's happy to support them – nationally and locally.

"I'm a lifetime member," he points out. But he acknowledges the challenge to attract new members and sustained leadership.

"They'll have to come to understand the millennial mindset," he says. "They're different. MOAA will have to ultimately give them something to coalesce around."

If you continue in my word you, you are truly my disciples, and you shall know the truth and the truth will set you free." -John 8:31-32 (NIV)


