Purple Heart recipients honored

August where 161 Purple Heart recipients from WWII, Korea, Vietnam, Afghanistan and Iraq were honored.

Among the honorees were five Cape Fear Chapter members: LTC (Ret) Clark Ecklund, LTC (Ret) Art Macaltao, MAJ (Ret) Steve Sosa, MAJ (Ret) Frank Till, and CW4 (Ret) George Weininger, all for wounds incurred during the Vietnam War. It was a proud moment for us when each of these gentlemen was introduced and walked through an arch of sabers, which by the way, were held by our Army JROTC cadets. Overall, it was a solemn yet celebratory event; extremely well done and certainly well deserved.

More pleasant news, MOAA National recently announced the Levels of Excellence Award winners for 2017 and the Cape Fear Chapter was selected as a Five Star Chapter again. This is the highest accolade a chapter can receive annually, and this makes four in a row for us.

Many factors go into judging a chapter, e.g., membership, recruiting and retention, frequency of meetings and events, attendance, charitable programs, community support, ROTC support, scholarship programs, to name a few. We do well in all these categories only because of your participation and generous support in terms of time, talents and treasure. We may all be justifiably proud; this achievement would

A primmer for members and friends on 'How to Support'

his is the time of year that we ask our members to donate their time, talents and/or treasure in support of our primary philanthropic endeavor – our ROTC Scholarship Awards Program. We are asking all chapter members to participate, or support this fund raiser in one way or another.

Hole Sponsorships. A donation of \$125 will sponsor a hole. You can sponsor a hole in your name, or in memory of a loved one. If you know of any business, civic or church group, or friend that would be willing to support a noble program ask them to sponsor a hole. Sponsorship entitles the sponsor to a professionally fabricated sign with the inscription, "This Hole Sponsored by," followed by the sponsor's name and/or other desired inscription, prominently displayed on one of the tee boxes during the tournament. The names of all sponsors are widely publicized in all tournament literature, our chapter newsletter, and our website.

Active Duty Soldiers Sponsorships: Our program to sponsor our active duty soldiers and wounded warriors to play in our golf tournament as our guests is a popular one. Our soldiers have a great time and our sponsors get a great sense of satisfaction in treating them. Our goal this year is to sponsor at least 60 active duty soldiers; the cost will be \$70 per soldier (the player

entry fee). The benefits of this program are several, but suffice it to say that it presents us with an opportunity to thank our active duty soldiers for their service by treating them to a great golf outing; and, it presents them an opportunity to interact with us.

Player: If you are a golfer, put your own team together and enter as a team; or, enter as an individual player and we'll pair you off.

Donations. A popular feature of our tournament is the drawing for prizes by players who purchase "Mulligan" chances. A ticket is issued for each "Mulligan" purchased and these tickets are used to draw for prizes. Prizes consist of golf related merchandise or accessories, or gift certificates/cards from restaurants and other commercial enterprises. Donations of such items are welcome and encouraged.

Spring Lake manager gets Pentagon position

SPRING LAKE — The town manager of Spring Lake has been nominated for a job in the Pentagon.

Tad Davis, a retired Army officer who previously served as garrison commander of Fort Bragg, will serve as the principal deputy assistant secretary of defense for energy, installations and environment, according to the Department of Defense.

Secretary of Defense Jim Mattis announced the appointment of Davis on Tuesday. Davis will start his new job in Wash-ington on Sept. 5, town officials said. He will provide budgetary, policy and management oversight of the U.S. military's real property portfolio, which is

valued at a trillion dollars and is spread across 500 installations. Davis had been town manager in Spring Lake for more than two years. Officials credited him with assisting the Board of Aldermen in reestablishing sound financial management procedures, improving the town's preparation for and response to natural disasters and fostering relations between the town, businesses, Fort Bragg and other groups.

"Tad Davis has been an extraordinary public servant, totally dedicated to the citizens of our great city, who led by example and daily exuded a level of energy and focus rarely seen in local governments" said Mayor Chris Rey. "Tad's departure is a great loss for our town, but a greater gain for our nation. We wish him and his family all the best!"

Davis has previously worked as chief executive officer for the U.S. Army Reserve and served as

deputy assistant secretary of the Army for environment, safety, and occupational health during

the President Bush administration. He is a graduate of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, New York, and Harvard University.

"I depart Spring Lake with deep admiration for our citizens and a tremendous amount of pride in our collective efforts as a community to make life just a little better for everyone each and every day," Davis said. "Looking ahead, I am truly humbled by the opportunity to return to Washington and to serve the men and women of our Armed Forces and their families both at home and abroad."

The Board of Alderman are slated to discuss options for Davis' replacement when they meet Monday evening, Davis said.

He said he had somewhat mixed emotions in accepting the Pentagon position.

Davis said the town had made great progress in recent years and that it was difficult to leave those efforts behind.

"But an opportunity like this doesn't come along very often," he said.

Davis said Spring Lake and the larger Fort Bragg area would always hold a special place in his heart. He said he plans to eventually move back to the area.


