Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I. Send me!''' - Isaiah 6:8v

s we get ready for Spring, let's declare for ourselves a new beginning under God. The Lord demonstrates this concept of new birth each day with the sunrise. And in nature, after a long hot-spell, the rain comes and the dry places come back to life again. In Spring buds start to form, flowers start to bloom and the earth transforms into a beautiful expression of color and life after a long hard winter. Through His Word we can have hope and start anew.

In our passage at the top of the page, the beloved king of Israel had passed away in that very year, and it was a time of transition. The man, Isaiah, was being called by the Lord in a heavenly vision. ## **Robert F. DeMeter Chapter Service Award**

he Robert F. **DeMeter** Chapter Service Award was established in 1998 in memory of the late Robert F. DeMeter.

The retired USMC lieutenant colonel was chapter president in 1989 and died before his term was completed.

In 1998, the first recipient of the DeMeter Award was Jerry Holstad.

It has been awarded annually to recognize a chapter member for outstanding service to the chapter. The award is the most prestigious award the chapter bestows upon one of its members.

By tradition, the DeMeter Award will not be presented more than once to an individual. The sole exception was to Harry Meinhardt who received it in 2009 and 2011. Again by tradition, the serving chapter president selects

the recipient after requesting nominations



from the membership. If the president wishes, he or she can form an awards board to review the nominations, or have the full board of directors review nominations and either select the recipient or submit its recommendation.

In this case, it is similar to the U.S. Senate's "advise and consent" role. However, it is the president receive it on the 16<sup>th</sup>? of the chapter who decides who receives the award.

Please note, the DeMeter Award has never been presented to a serving president.

Outstanding service is defined as: A significant and extraordinary achievement in support of the chapter during the calendar year for which considered, or (2)Sustained meritorious and extraordinary service to the chapter over a period of time.

The award consists of a certificate and a rotating trophy, which the recipient retains for one year.

Nominations for the DeMeter Award are solicited from the general membership every January, boarded or reviewed, and then awarded during the March general membership meeting.

## **IN MEMORIAM**



### Retired U.S. Army Major Frank R. Till June 5, 1941 – February 10, 2019

It is with deep regret that we announce that retired Army Major Frank R. Till, one of our regular members died on February 10, 2019.

Frank enlisted in the US Army as a private and rapidly rose through the ranks to sergeant first class before attending Officer Candidate School at Fort Benning, Georgia, and earning a commission as a second lieutenant of Infantry in June 1965. He served in Vietnam as a rifle Company Commander with the 9<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division and was seriously wounded in June 1968 and spent many months in numerous Army hospitals.

Frank was awarded the Silver Star, the Bronze Star for valor, the Purple Heart, and the Combat Infantryman Badge among many other awards. He retired from the Army as a Major in 1983 and spent the next 20 years as a teacher and administrator in the Fayetteville Academy.

Frank was a loyal member of the chapter for several years and his reputation as an extraordinary soldier and leader was well known; his loss will be keenly felt by all of us. His over 25 years of distinguished military service and personal sacrifices to our country will never be forgotten.


